ABOUT WASHOE COUNTY

Washoe County is located along the eastern slopes of the majestic Sierra Nevada mountains in north-western Nevada. The county covers an area of 6,600 square miles and has a population of over 450,000.

The county seat is the City of Reno, the third largest city in Nevada. It's also home to the City of Sparks, the state's fifth largest city, and Incline Village at Lake Tahoe. The population base for the County is split with nearly half the population in the incorporated City of Reno, one quarter in Sparks, and one quarter in the unincorporated areas.

Message from the Comptroller

To the Citizens of Washoe County:

I am pleased to present to you the Washoe County Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR) for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018. This report is intended to increase awareness throughout the community of the financial operations of the County. As such, this report is written in a user friendly manner that summarizes and communicates the County's overall financial condition. Washoe County's financial activities are made up of two main classifications: governmental activities and business-type activities. Governmental activities include all primary governmental functions such as judicial, public safety, public works, welfare, etc. Business-type activities include a sewer utility, golf courses and building permits.

In addition to providing financial information, it is important to demonstrate what makes Washoe County a great place to live, work, and invest. The County is growing as new citizens and businesses continue to relocate to northern Nevada.

Financial information within this report is derived in large part from the County's 2018 independently audited set of financial statements prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. These audited statements are part of the County's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) available at https://www.washoecounty.us/comptroller/CAFR/index.php

Washoe County Initiatives

- Washoe County currently has a Strategic Planning committee to focus specifically on economic development and its impacts in our community. The group seeks to address and define the impact of Washoe County services in terms of cost of resources.
- The County 's new centralized service center, Washoe 311 was completed. This service center answers citizens requests and fields and responds to internal requests.
- Washoe County partnered with the State of Nevada and local regional partners to se-

cure leasing nearly a dozen buildings on the Northern Nevada Adult Mental Health System campus to expand the County's Crossroads program and enhance homeless services for the community. 2017-18 PAGE 3

Local Economy and Outlook

Over the last year, Washoe County continued to show signs of an improving economy since the Great Recession, but signs of a slow down may be on the horizon going forward. Some economic measures and indicators of the local economy include:

The median home prices increased by 16% over the prior year, but existing home sales decreased 7.5% over the prior year, and lack of affordable housing has become a significant issue in the County

- The population continued to grow, and from 2017 to 2018 increased by approximately 2%
- Employment growth has been strong, with the number of new jobs added growing at a rate of 4% annually, however, employment is a lagging economic indicator
- Industrial buildings vacancy rates continue to drop with new ongoing construction.






General Fund Revenue

The two largest sources of revenue for Washoe County are ad valorem taxes, which are based on assessed property values, and consolidated taxes, which are based primarily on taxable sales, and also include motor vehicle registration fees, cigarette and liquor taxes, and other components. These revenue sources are expected to see continued moderated growth in the coming fiscal year. Ad valorem taxes on existing residential homes are capped at 3% annual increases by Nevada state law. Other revenue sources include charges for services, grants, licenses and permits.




Revenues from ad valorem taxes have risen over the past 4 fiscal years.

Fund balance includes components that are non-spendable, legally restricted and otherwise committed or assigned.

Washoe County's General Fund balance trend line shows moderate increase over the last 10 years. **Washoe County** cautiously navigated through the Great Recession (2007-2010) and 2 federally recognized natural disasters in 2017 to preserve its financial health. General Fund balance meets minimums established by Nevada Revised Statutes.

Outstanding debt related to governmental activities decreased by \$8 million due to regularly scheduled principal payments, discounts, premiums and deferred charges on refunding. The current debt limitation for the County is \$1.6 billion which is \$1.4 billion in excess of the County's outstanding general obligation debt.

Key Terms:

Governmental funds: The County maintains various governmental funds that are used to account for tax, program and other miscellaneous revenues.

<u>Business-type Funds</u>: The County maintains various business-type funds that are used to account for activities for which a fee is charged to external users for goods or services.

<u>Assets</u>: What is owned by the County.

<u>Liabilities</u>: What the County owes.

<u>Net Assets</u>: The difference between the County's assets and liabilities. It is the net worth of the County.

<u>Current and other assets</u>: Includes such items as pooled cash and investments, receivables, internal balances, inventories, deposits with others and prepaid items and .

<u>Capital assets:</u> Includes such items as County land, easements, construction in progress, software, equipment, infrastructure and buildings and improvements net of depreciation.


