 - **SUBJECT:** Presentation and discussion by Gabrielle Enfield, regarding a status update and recommendation to approve allocation of American Rescue Plan Act funds through the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund and Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund in a total amount of \$40,201,764.00, and possible approval of recommended allocations of the funds and direction to the Comptroller's Office to make necessary net zero cross-fund and crossfunctional budget appropriation transfers, as well as authorization to Human Resources, per Job Evaluation Committee (JEC) evaluation as applicable, to create necessary positions to the 23 proposed projects as follows:

The proposed projects fall within the American Rescue Plan Act (and the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund and Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund) eligible uses, include a proposed implementation process, and come with extensive compliance and reporting requirements. Final allocations may vary from those proposed based on information developed during this item. (All Commission Districts.) FOR POSSIBLE ACTION

SUMMARY

Recommendation to approve allocation of American Rescue Plan Act funds through the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund and Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund in a total amount of \$40,201,764.00, and direct Comptroller's Office to make necessary budget adjustments, and authorize Human Resources to create necessary positions to the 23 proposed projects. This staff report provides summary information proposed ARPA- SLFRF projects. The Board of County Commissioners will approval all ARPA-SLFRF over \$500,000.

Washoe County Strategic Objective supported by this item: Safe, Secure and Healthy Communities

PREVIOUS ACTION

On July 20, 2021, the Washoe County Board of Commissioners accepted Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds allocation from the United States Department of the Treasury in the amount of [\$91,587,038; no county match], authorized the County Manager to sign award documents and direct the Comptroller's Office to make the necessary budget amendments.

On July 20, 2021, the Washoe County Board of Commissioners authorized Washoe County Manager Eric Brown to enter all necessary professional services agreements and construction contracts in support of the Nevada Cares Campus, Safe Camp and Homeless Housing Sprung Facility Improvements in an amount not to exceed \$8,500,000, inclusive of \$3,500,000 in previous authority granted May 25, 2021, to be funded with Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds as allowable; directing the Manager to provide periodic updates to the Washoe County Board of Commissioners regarding project status and project costs and budget Nevada Cares Campus; directing that all such agreements and contracts shall conform and be let in compliance with Nevada law as applicable including Nevada Revised Statutes Chapter 332 "Purchasing: Local Governments," NRS Chapter 338 "Public Works," Washoe County purchasing and procurement policies, and all associated Federal guidelines; direct the Comptroller's Office to make the necessary cross-fund, cross-function budget appropriation transfers. Community Services.

On August 17, 2021, the Washoe County Board of Commissioners approved Amendment #1 to the Agreement between Washoe County and Well Care Services Reno to support the pilot program for supportive housing of persons with intellectual or developmental disabilities or mental health conditions that impede their ability to live with complete independence retroactive August 1, 2021 through July 31, 2022 for [\$612,000] to be funded with Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds as allowable; and if approved, authorize the Purchasing and Contracts Manager to execute Amendment #1; direct the Comptroller's Office to make the necessary cross-fund, cross-function budget appropriation transfers.

BACKGROUND

On March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan Act was signed into law, and established the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund and Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund. Washoe County has been awarded a grant of \$91,587,038 in State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF). On May 17, 2021, Washoe County received advance payment from the Department of Treasury in the amount of \$45,793,519, fifty percent of the award funds. The SLFRF provide a substantial infusion of resources to help turn the tide on the pandemic, address its economic fallout, and lay the foundation for a strong and equitable recovery.

Eligible Uses of the Funds:

- 1. Support Public Health Response & Address Negative Economic Impacts:
 - a. <u>Support Public Health Response</u>: Fund COVID-19 mitigation efforts, medical expenses, behavioral healthcare, and certain public health and safety staff.
 - b. <u>Address Negative Economic Impacts</u>: Respond to economic harms to workers, families, small businesses, impacted industries, and the public sector.
 - c. <u>Disproportionately Impacted:</u> Addressing disparities for populations, households, or geographic areas disproportionately impacted by the pandemic.
- 2. Premium Pay for Essential Workers: Provide premium pay to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency, or by providing grants to eligible employers that have eligible workers who performed essential work.
- 3. Replace Public Sector Revenue Loss: Use funds to provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the pandemic.
- 4. Water and Sewer Infrastructure & Broadband:
 - a. Make necessary investments to improve access to clean drinking water and invest in wastewater and storm water infrastructure.
 - **b.** Make necessary investments to provide unserved or underserved locations with Non-Federal Match: SLFRF may not be used as non-federal match for other

Federal programs whose statute or regulations bar the use of Federal funds to meet matching requirements.

Key Principles of SLFRF:

- Projects should advance shared interest and promote equitable delivery of government benefits and opportunities to underserved communities as outline in Executive Order 13985 -Advancing Racial Equity and Support for Underserved Communities Through the Federal Government.
- Many projects respond to the public health emergency and meet urgent community needs. Swift and effective implementation is vital, and recipients must balance simple and rapid program access with necessary documentation and compliance.
- Transparency and Public Accountability for SLFRF Funds are critical to upholding program integrity and trust in government at all levels. Funds should be managed consistent with OMJB Memorandum M-21-20 and Memorandum M-20-21.

SLFRF Reporting:

<u>Project & Expenditure Report:</u> Description on all projects funded, expenditures, contracts & subawards \$50,000 or more. Due January 31, 2022, thereafter 30 days after end each quarter.

<u>Recovery Plan Performance Report (Annual Report)</u>: The Recovery Plan Performance Report (the "Recovery Plan") provides information on potential projects and being undertaken with program funding and how Washoe County will ensure program outcomes are achieved in an effective, efficient, and equitable manner. The Initial Recovery Plan is posted on the Washoe County website at https://www.washoecounty.gov/ARPA/ as well as provided to Treasury on August 31, 2021. Due July 31, 2022.

Interim Report (financial): Overview of status and uses of funding, expenditures, and obligations through July 31, by category. Submitted August 31, 2021, one-time report.

SLFRF Implementation:

Over the past several months Community Reinvestment staff has reviewed existing community existing planning documents including the Washoe County Strategic Plan, Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan, COVID19-2021 Recovery Action Plan, Regional Strategy for Housing Affordability, Community Health Improvement Plan, and other community-wide planning documents to determine goals, objectives, and projects needed in our community that align with SLFRF eligible categories.

Throughout this time, we have gathered input on priorities and potential projects from county residents, community nonprofit organizations, and key stakeholders; and gathered input on priorities and potential projects from county staff, elected officials and department heads.

Priority projects have been identified that represented urgent projects vital to addressing the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. Each project submitted an internal Washoe County application and has been evaluated to ensure ARPA-SLFRF eligibility.

Although, some projects include staffing to address caseload backlogs and/or address increased service needs due to the COVID-19 public health emergency. These positions are short term, some only for the remainder of this fiscal year (through June 30, 2021), others for up to 24 months. No ARPA project related staffing is proposed that exceeds 24 months. ARPA administrative staffing will be funded by the grant an excess of 24 months to properly administer the federal grant award through the execution of all ARPA funded projects, potentially through December 2026.

Funding for these twenty-three projects, along with the funding budgeted for the administration of the ARPA implementation (and a few potential projects still being evaluated for eligibility), represent the majority of the first tranche of ARPA funding received by Washoe County on May 17, 2021. Staff does not expect funding availability for additional project award processes prior to the receipt of the second tranche of funding, expected in May of 2022.

Description:	The operations of the Kids Kottage supports abused and neglected children in our community that have been removed from their homes. Many of these children have been disproportionately impacted by the hardships imposed by the pandemic such as lost wages in their home, school closures, and lost access to community resources throughout the pandemic – including medical and mental health resources. The largest driver for the increased need of emergency beds is directly related to the closure of pediatric psychiatric units in the community because facilities report being unable to hire and retain staff to meet the strict staff to patient ratios for children. The only alternative would be to use inpatient hospital bed-holds at traditional medical hospitals which has proven to be ineffective as this competes with beds used for COVID patients. Additionally, there is a shortage of in-home foster care and in-home emergency foster care beds in the community due to an inability to recruit and retain qualified foster

Description:	RecommendedThe COVID-19 public health emergency has had a profound and enduring impact on the children of the community and families with children. The stressors of the pandemic have led to an increase in child abuse and neglect intake referrals and assessment cases. HSA identified three positions critical to managing the increased demand on staffing.One Runner position will assist with child transportation needs. Washoe County School District is facing a critical bus driver shortage, which leaves the transportation to school, and other appointments (Doctor, Dentist, Counselor, Activities) up to WCHSA staff. One Intake Screener position will assist with the increase of referrals, especially during peak hours. Intake calls are up by more than 1200 calls so far this year. Intake is critical as it is where reports of abuse and neglect come into the agency. One Assessment specific Case Worker III is needed due to increased referrals. Case workers initiate contact after Intake to determine if there is a danger or need in the household. Over the past fiscal year, WCHSA has seen a tremendous increase in service volume. In FY20, WCHSA received 6,074 reports of child abuse and/or neglect. This increased to 7,273 in FY21, an increase of 17% in just one year.

The fencing is required by contract and supports the safety of the residents from external threats such as violent domestic partners, drug dealers, etc. In addition to shelter the staff provide case management, job search, medical screening, and housing assistance. Description:	Sparks Justice Court needs ARPA funds to upgrade courtroom audiovisual technology. The project meets the growing demand for remote access to justice for public safety, expedited processing of case backlog due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and addresses the negative impact of low-quality audiovisual technology on Limited English Proficiency (LEP) individuals and those who are hard of hearing. Additionally, this project addresses the quality of evidence sharing with onsite and remote parties and the preservation of such records within the certified recording system. Description:	RemodelApprovalReno Justice Court has at times restricted the number of individuals who can come to the Court in-person during the pandemic. Although many types of cases can still be adjudicated in such circumstances due to remote proceedings, criminal trials cannot be conducted remotely as criminal defendants have a Constitutional right to in-person cross-examination of witnesses against them. This has created a significant back log of criminal cases. The difficulty associated with holding criminal trials is especially challenging in the context of a jury trial, as it requires the Court to summon between 40-60 citizens in order to select a jury. This difficulty was exacerbated with the enactment of Nevada Assembly Bill 42, which expanded the size of a justice court jury from six to twelve. The Court has an obligation to protect the health and safety of a jury by providing a jury box that will allow some level of social distancing. In order to provide for social distancing and comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) the Court must completely remodel an existing courtroom in order to build a large, 12-person jury box.

Description:	Reno Justice Court is currently constructing a physical space to house a self-help center, but it has not yet secured funding to furnish the space with computer terminals, workstations, chairs, and modular walls/doors for conference rooms. Once this area is furnished, self-represented litigants will be able to use the space to, among other things, oppose a residential eviction, oppose a debt collection proceeding, seal a criminal record, or file/oppose a small claims case. Self-represented litigants will be able to obtain assistance with registering for the Court's electronic filing system, and the Court will allow representative from local legal aid organizations to use the space to provide advice and counsel to these individuals.

Description:	The COVID-19 pandemic has affected every aspect of life, including the functions of the Washoe County Sheriff's Office. From increased high-risk calls for service such as domestic violence to the expanded mental health needs of individuals housed in the Detention Facility, the workload placed on Deputies has increased exponentially. Given that staffing levels have not recovered since the Recession, the continuing effects of the pandemic require the Sheriff's Office to add personnel on an expedited and immediate basis.			
	 Sheriff's Office deputies are the first responders to emergency calls from both the Nevada Cares Campus and the Washoe County Safe Camp. These calls will involve more time and complexity. In the past 6 months, law enforcement responded to 350 calls to the Cares Campus and to "Our Place," a homeless encampment approximately 158 times. Deputies are also regularly called to homeless encampments throughout Washoe County. Compounding the effects of the pandemic, employment losses have resulted in working conditions in patrol and detention that are unsafe and unsustainable. In 1997, there were 396 total deputy sheriff positions. In 2021, there are 367 deputies: this, despite an increasing citizen and jail population. Effects of the pandemic have exacerbated this shortage and the ability to deliver services. From December 21, 2020, through August 29, 2021, 35 commissioned officers left their employment with the Sheriff's office. From a patrol perspective, in 2019, patrol deputies responded to 65 calls involving mental health crisis. In 2021, patrol responded to approximately 100 such calls. Additionally, violent crime in the region has followed
