




The internet has made our job very interesting in the past two decades.



Common types of housing you will see in people's homes

















Many animals like to burrow or camouflage, so just because you don't see something, doesn't mean the enclosure is empty

Use caution when handling these animals. Use proper PPE and take precautions to keep yourself and the animals safe

- Many exotic animals can harm you in more ways than just biting. You need to be aware that large snakes can constrict you, venomous snakes can envenomate you, lizards and crocodilians can harm you with their teeth, nails and tail, amphibians can secret toxins from poison glands and some tarantulas can flick urticating hairs that can affect your vision and breathing.
- Did you know that scientists are discovering that more and more monitor lizards have venom glands? If they bite you, they will lacerate your skin while also blending venom into their saliva.





































Feeding and Nutrition







Snakes: Mice, rats, or rabbits

Bearded Dragons: Dark leafy greens, veggies, insects'

Iguanas: Dark leafy greens, veggies, fruit

Tegus: Small rodents, fruit, eggs, insects

Monitors: Insects, eggs, small rodents

Geckos: Primarily insects, some fruit



- There are commercial diets available for many species, but some animals will refuse to eat them. Fresh food is best!
- Most lizards will require a mineral/calcium supplement (+D3). Lack of calcium can lead to Metabolic Bone Disease.
- Remember, a cold reptile can't properly digest their food!
