

## 2022 WASHOE IMPACT AWARD: QUALITY PUBLIC SERVICE

In 2017 Washoe County created a county-wide awards program to recognize and celebrate the exemplary work our teams and team members have done in the previous year. The awards embody our organizational values, commit to our strategic direction, and most importantly reflects the positive impact made to the people we serve.

#### WCRAS CARES PROGRAM

The CARES program was created to provide qualifying residents low-barrier access to veterinary care and other supportive pet related services in order to keep people and pets together and promote responsible pet ownership. Funded by community donations to the Injured Animal Fund, the CARES program utilizes partnerships among animal care organizations in Washoe County to coordinate pet care at lower rates, allowing each donated dollar to go farther for a pet in need.

In 2022 this program ramped up services and was able to provide monetary support for 491 unique animals to receive basic and necessary veterinary services.

The average cost of care for each pet helped with this program was \$150.



## WHO IS THE CARES PROGRAM HELPING?

- A local senior who recently lost their job and had only \$25 for veterinary care was able to use CARES funds to get an exam and eye removal surgery for her beloved cat who had sustained a serious eye injury.
- A local individual experiencing homelessness was able to use CARES funds to cover an exam and surgery to remove a fast growing mass on their dog's lip that was affecting the dog's ability to eat.
- A local senior with no income who was recovering from a recently broken back was able to use CARES funds to get an exam, wound cleaning, and treatment for his dog who had sustained wounds from a dog attack.
- A local, low-income resident who was facing eviction from her apartment complex unless they got their cat neutered immediately. She had only \$25 to pay toward the neuter and was able to use CARES funds to cover the rest of the cost to have her cat fixed and keep her housing.



"Rowdy" was referred to the CARES program by an Officer after he sustained a severe tail injury from a dog attack. Rowdy's owner lacked transportation and funds for veterinary care, leaving her feeling helpless and worried for her pet's well-being. Thanks to the CARES program, Animal Services staff was able to transport Rowdy to Klaich Animal Hospital, one of our valuable program partners, where he received the necessary medical attention, including the amputation of the injured tail section. The next day, the Officer was able to reunite Rowdy with his owner, who was overjoyed to see him doing much better! Without the CARES program, pets like Rowdy might not receive timely veterinary care or and may even face euthanasia.
