

Hello friends,

As promised, the Nevada Humane Society team wants to broaden the level of information you have at your disposal regarding our organization as it relates to the professional services agreement with Washoe County Regional Animal Services. To begin, we will be showcasing our 2023 year-end numbers that reference both adoption and surrender numbers for the year. Despite an atypical year, the team continually rallied to prioritize the welfare of the animals needing assistance in northern Nevada.

A few notes of context are relevant here:

- Nevada Humane Society is entered into a public service agreement with Washoe County, stipulating that our nonprofit act as the official public surrender facility for Washoe County.
- Numbers below include counts for our Reno and Carson City facilities.
- In 2023, the Nevada Humane Society raised the alarm to the northern Nevada community multiple times that we were nearing capacity. As you well know, the demographics of Washoe County continue to flex and grow. Paired with high costs of living and inflation, this means our animal population is also impacted.
