Northern Nevada Continuum of Care

National Alliance to End Homelessness defines a Continuum of Care (CoC) as: A regional or local planning body that <u>coordinates</u> housing and services funding for homeless families and individuals.


- 1. Completing a consolidated application annually
 - Annual community application for funding (FY 23 Funding: \$3,197,878)
- 2. Monitoring CoC grantees
- 3. Managing Coordinated Entry
 - 3. No wrong door, standardized assessment and utilization of a prioritized list of people experiencing homelessness from which housing referrals are made
- 4. Point in Time Count
- 5. Maintaining Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)
- 6. HUD reporting





The Approach: Getting to zero takes moral courage, data-driven thinking, and a system-wide approach.

Getting to zero takes a whole system built to drive reductions and to achieve a lasting end to homelessness that leaves no one behind.

A definition of success limited to program outcomes.

Success is widely measured by the success of housing programs, not on whether a community reduces the number of people experiencing homelessness.



No single actor is fully accountable for ending homelessness in a community.

Each local agency or program holds its own small piece of the solution, but no one has their eye on how the pieces fit together.



A once-a-year count of a problem that changes nightly.

Annual street counts are a snapshot; your community needs a video. Getting to zero takes line of sight into how people move through your system over time. Housing supply paralysis. Expanded housing resources are crucial, but many cities have dramatically expanded housing supply without making a dent in homelessness. The reason? They never fixed the housing system.



A commitment to functional zero.

The command center operates under a unified aim of reducing the number of individuals experiencing homelessness as the key measure of their results — all the way down to zero.



An integrated, command center team.

Key agencies, like the Continuum of Care, the housing authority, local government, and the VA, work together every week toward a shared definition of zero.



Comprehensive, real-time, by-name data.

Built for Zero communities know everyone experiencing homelessness by name, in real time. The result is more tailored solutions for individuals and a clearer picture of the system as a whole.





- Improved coordination between campuses and justice system







Local Trends

By-name List: The by-name list is a real-time, dynamic and comprehensive list of people experiencing homelessness in your community.

Reported Monthly

Rolling 90-day number of people experiencing homelessness

Unsheltered data ONLY pulled from HMIS

BFZ Methodology

Purpose: The by-name list provides communities with a full and real-time view of homelessness. Using this data, cities and counties are able to triage individual cases, understand the broader patterns of homelessness in their community, and ensure that resources and efforts are driving down the overall number of people experiencing homelessness to zero. **Point In Time Count:** Point-in-Time (PIT) count is a count of sheltered and unsheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night in January.

Reported Annually (late January every year)

One day snapshot


Unsheltered population is counted in person

HUD Methodology

Purpose: The Point-in-time count is a requirement from HUD. The purpose of the count is to estimate the size of the population in need of housing and supportive services which in turn effects the funding our community receives from HUD for those services.
